Re: Trademark Infringement

Dear Mr. Asor:

This firm represents Citrix Systems, Inc., (“Citrix”) in connection with its intellectual property matters. As you may know, Citrix is the global leader in the provision of online solutions that enable people to work from anywhere with anyone to facilitate efficiency and productivity, and in providing virtualization, networking and software as a service technologies.

Among other trademarks, Citrix owns the following U.S. federal registrations for the family of trademarks identified below:

In addition, Citrix owns over 75 registrations or pending applications in 40 jurisdictions around the world for the marks above (collectively, the international marks and the U.S. marks shall be referred to as the “Citrix XEN Marks”). In short, the Citrix XEN Marks comprise a unique and

highly distinctive family of XEN-style marks used in connection with a variety of virtualization tools and solutions, which tools and solutions Citrix markets and sells globally. Citrix's use of the Citrix XEN Marks dates back to 2002, and, as you can imagine, the company has invested substantial amounts of time and money in promoting the Citrix XEN Marks. As a result, Citrix has developed an invaluable amount of goodwill in its family of Citrix XEN Marks, which goodwill the company is anxious to protect.

Recently, it has come to Citrix's attention that you have adopted and use the trade name and trademark XENNET, XENFS, and XENTUBE (collectively the "Infringing Marks") in connection with virtualization software. Your use of Infringing Marks is likely to cause confusion in the marketplace between genuine Citrix XEN branded goods and services and those offered by your company under the Infringing Marks.

In light of the foregoing, Citrix requests that you immediately agree, in writing, to:

1. stop all use and promotion of the mark and the trade name XENNET, XENFS, XENTUBE, and all other marks integrating "XEN" (including, without limitation XENCOINS); and
2. Transfer the domain names www.xennet.io and www.xennet.sc to Citrix and migrate the existing content to a non-infringing URL that is not likely to cause confusion with Citrix.

Although we trust that this matter can be resolved amicably, Citrix will consider taking whatever measures may be necessary to protect its valuable intellectual property rights, including initiating legal proceedings seeking, among other things, injunctive relief, damages, and attorneys' fees.

We look forward to receiving your response no later than September 23, 2014.
